"It was my dad's commitment to Glenwood Springs that propelled him to give so generously with his service and philanthropy, thereby instilling this same calling in his children and grandchildren."

The Vanderhoof name is synonymous with philanthropy and community leadership. We were pleased to work with the family in establishing a donor-advised endowment fund in 2003. Their family was instrumental in forging the affiliation partnership between our two community foundations. Our regional Community Foundation manages 12 different endowed charitable funds to benefit the Glenwood Springs community.

The Vanderhoof Family requests that memorial contributions be made in Don's name to the Western Colorado Community Foundation for the Vanderhoof Family Fund. The family will distribute grants in Don's memory in Glenwood Springs later in the year.

Throughout our community, countless professionals deal with trauma every day - in law enforcement, social work, counseling, first response, health/medicine, education and many other fields. While these dedicated people navigate vicarious trauma and fatigue, they often suffer in silence, which leads to burnout and resignation. Our community needs to support these professionals so they can continue their vital work.

As part of our 20th anniversary impact grants initiative, our Community Foundation funded a new program that will offer monthly sessions facilitated by licensed professional counselors from the Counseling and Education Center (CEC) and the Western Slope Center for Children (The Center). The **Resilience 2018** program will help participants develop personal and professional skills to build resiliency, increase work satisfaction and prevent helper fatigue.

Resilience 2018 kicks off in February and their 40 slots are already filled. Additional trainings will be offered in the future. Other partner agencies in this collaboration include Mesa County Public Health Department, Hilltop Community Resources, and the Grand Junction Police Department.


